SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The Foundation has been active and involved in numerous projects and curricular enhancements at the Adams Township Schools. This District is fortunate to have an energetic Foundation with a vision that coincides with our own. I am pleased to report on the progress of these programs and the importance of sustaining them over the next few years.

Our Trades Program has been initiated this year and I predict it will be an important and practical alternative for students. This course will teach students the fundamentals behind the fields of welding, carpentry, masonry, electrical and plumbing by performing and learning these skills in the classroom under the supervision of visiting contractors and our industrial arts teacher. The students will then have the opportunity to gain additional experience by working directly with that contractor at a job site. While at the job site, the students will be evaluated on the skills of the trade, punctuality, dependability and other skills that I feel are just as important as learning the trade itself. To sustain this program, the Foundation is asking for sponsors to help purchase the tools for the trade being taught through this curriculum. Each trade will have a "bucket" of tools used by students at the job site and the classroom. A donation toward the purchase of these tools will give the students in the Adams Township School District the opportunity to explore and experience a skill that will remain with them for a lifetime.

Another curricular enhancement that the Foundation has sponsored is the new piano

class being taught this semester. I requested from the Foundation financial help to incorporate a different music class into the curriculum. Mrs. Emily Raffaelli proposed to me the idea of a piano class to give students another opportunity in the curriculum other than band. The Foundation generously gave their support and helped the District purchase 10 keyboards. I had the privilege and honor to be in attendance at the first piano recital at Jeffers High School as 10 students proudly and tentatively performed for the first time on a piano.

The Foundation and the Adams Township School District are actively providing opportunities for students. You can become part of these opportunities and help shape the direction of this District by financially contributing to these worthwhile programs being sponsored by the Foundation.

HIGH SCHOOL HAPPENINGS By: Mike Benda, Assistant Principal

Early this year we received a visit from the Mackinac Center for Public Policy. They had come to JHS for a film they were making about the top ten traditional public schools in Michigan. Small schools = Big Success.

Mrs. Pera and Mrs. McCormick were selected last spring to be part of the GK12 Global Watershed Fellows program through MTU. The program partners Michigan Tech PhD students with middle and high school teachers to create lesson plans and activities that transfer their doctoral research on watershed science topics to the teachers and students. Our Fellows, Melanie Yang and Ashley Coble, work closely with Mrs. Pera and Mrs. McCormick in the classroom twice a week and will continue through next year.

Mrs. McCormick and the biology class spent the morning of September 26th collecting data for the EPA as part of the Superfund research being done at that site. The class collected soil samples and biomass samples and has been analyzing them throughout the year for nutrient content.

Mrs. Pera, Ms. Ruohonen and Mrs. Yang took the 7th grade students to the MTU Water Festival on October 5th. Our students and teachers attended and participated in sessions that included topics on; "How to Catch a Fish", "Dirty Water: Stream Erosion and Sediment", "Use of Native Medicinal Plants by Indigenous Great Lakes Peoples", and "Water Infiltration Races".

Mrs. Lisa Raffaelli and Mrs. Pera have been taking part in Project PRIME - Promoting Reform in Mathematics Education, which is a state-wide project. It is a series of 6 workshops focusing on implementing the Common Core State Standards in Algebra.

They have also been participating in a Professional Learning Community focused on Science & Math Misconception Management (SAM3). They have been looking at how to identify & address student misconceptions in math, mainly related to fractions. Mrs. McCormick is also participating in SAM3, addressing these same topics in science.

Last fall several students and Mrs. McCormick participated in the Pilgrim River Macro invertebrate study which is conducted each year in association with Trout Unlimited and The Pilgrim River Project. Our lab facilities are used each year to sort and analyze the samples. This ongoing study relates to the general health and cleanliness of the Pilgrim River watershed.

The newly formed Jeffers High School Business & Technology Club hosted "Digital Learning Day" on Wednesday, February 6, 2013, from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. There are currently nineteen members and the advisors are Mrs. Wuorinen and Miss Laurie Stark.

The members of the Jeffers High School Business & Technology Club taught computer and technology sessions to the public. The nine sessions included Budgeting with Excel, Working with Word, Attaching Files to Google Email. Professional Presenting, Useful Informational Websites and Internet Toolbar, Online Safety, Staying in Touch Wherever and Whenever, Picture Uploading and Editing, and Personalize with Microsoft Publisher. Each session was 30 minutes. The attendees (adult students) were impressed with the high school students' knowledge, helpfulness, confidence, and professionalism. Many attendees said they would be interested in additional Digital Learning Days but would like longer sessions. The Jeffers High School Business & Technology Club members are excited to host another Digital Learning Day soon.

Several Band members participated in the Solo and Ensemble competition at Lake Linden on February 2nd and according to Mrs. Emily Raffaelli they all did very well, receiving ratings of "2". Paris Puuri, a junior, received a "1" and will be representing Jeffers at the State Solo and Ensemble Festival at NMU on March 23rd. Our music department also purchased 10 electronic pianos from funding received by the Adams Township School Foundation. This purchase has enabled Mrs. Emily Raffaelli to offer 11 of our students the opportunity to learn to play the piano.

Across the nation, elementary schools in March traditionally celebrate "Reading Month." A time set aside to reinforce and provide additional activities focusing on the importance of reading in a child's life. At South Range Elementary School we have embarked on a new program called One School, One Book as our focus during March. This program is designed to create a shared reading experience within our entire school family. As a staff we chose a single chapter book that was purchased for every family in the school. Over the course of the month, each family reads the book and activities are planned at school that help to promote the reading experience. Daily trivia questions are given, and dress-up days and school-wide assemblies are some of the events that will occur.

One School, One Book touches every family in our district with children at the elementary school. I am grateful to the Foundation for providing the funding to purchase the 175 needed books. The book chosen is Lynne Reid Banks, *The Indian in the Cupboard*. With the success of this program I am also hoping this is something we will be able to continue each March.

"When a whole school reads a book, there is a lot to talk about" and with everyone's help, we can build a Community of Readers at our school.

Updates on Hei Suomi & Elementary Art

Two students from Finland will be arriving in the Copper Country at the end of the month. Olli-Pekka Autonen and Matleena Heikkila will be spending four weeks working with our third grade students. Similar to last year's program, the visiting teachers will primarily focus on introducing the Finnish culture, language and customs. However, new to this year will be an exciting opportunity for our students to connect with an elementary school in Finland. The two classrooms are going to work together to produce an on-line newspaper. Access our school website to check it out!

South Range Elementary had eight students' artwork that was selected to be on display at the Copper Country Community Art Center in Hancock throughout the month of March. Students ranged from kindergarten through sixth grade. The artwork is on display as a celebration of Youth Art Month. Thanks to Miss Bolthouse and the Art program, this opportunity was made possible.

The programs that the Foundation is helping to support are allowing our students to participate in opportunities that they would not normally have had. Being exposed to the arts and cultural diversity in a variety of ways is a valuable asset that is now being fulfilled.

National History Day By: Cheryl Ruohonen, JHS Teacher

National History Day is an opportunity for students to showcase their talents in the field of academics. This program has been in effect for 39 years, but students at Jeffers High School have only been participating in it for the past seven. However, during that time, we have had over 500 students participate by creating History Day projects, which begin at the classroom level. Then, many more have had the opportunity to compete at the regional, state and national levels, thanks in large part to the ATSD Foundation, Inc.

One might have questions such as, What is History Day? Why should we support it? How does this benefit our students?

National History Day is an annual contest based around a set theme. For example, the 2013 theme was "Turning Points in History – People, Ideas, Events." From there, students choose any topic they find interesting, conduct research using both primary and secondary sources, develop a thesis statement, analyze and organize their information to support their thesis and apply it to the overall theme, and finally create a project that demonstrates their knowledge about the topic. Sample topics from this year's JHS students included some of the following: Elvis Presley, Title IX legislation, the bombing of Pearl Harbor, the Manhattan Project, the Boston Tea Party, inventions such as the light bulb, the tractor,

the railroad, and more. Students not only decide their topics but also whether they'd like to work alone or in a group. They also choose which type of project to do from writing a research paper; doing a performance; or creating a website, a documentary, or an exhibit.

Reasons to support and encourage participation in a program such as National History Day include 1) the projects are studentdriven, project-based learning, which offers variety, demands original thinking, and develops "habits of the mind"; 2) it meets and exceeds many of the state and national standards in English and Social Studies (and probably other subject areas as well); 3) it provides academic competition and alternative assessment; and 4) there is great public relations for the school district.

In addition to that mentioned above, students also have opportunities to travel and enjoy other perks that make it fun. Many may never have these opportunities otherwise. Every year since 2006, Jeffers High School has had students represent the district at the regional competition (held at MTU in late February) and state competition (held in downstate Michigan in late April). And, for 4 years in a row from 2006-2010, JHS had students compete at the national competition, which is held each June at the University of Maryland. This epitomizes our motto of "Small Schools, Big Success."

With the continued support of the Adams Township Schools Foundation, we can continue to offer these opportunities to our students. This year, there are 10, eighth grade students who have advanced to the state level. One group's exhibit was on the bombing of Pearl Harbor. The other group's exhibit covered Title IX legislation. These students are excited about making their projects even better for the state competition, and they would greatly appreciate any financial support that the Foundation may be able to offer.

During my junior year of high school I participated in Health Careers, a program that allows you to job shadow the medical field of your choice, an extremely valuable experience. In my senior year of high school, I was part of the Nurse's Aide Program where we received the training to become a CNA (Certified Nursing Assistant.) Both programs are valuable in their own way. As budgets tighten, it seems these "extra" programs would be the first to be cut. I however believe that they are irreplaceable; they teach real world skills and provide training the traditional classroom cannot. The Adams Township School District Foundation provides thousands of dollars in scholarships to graduating seniors each year. These scholarships help relieve the financial burden a college student faces and allow students to focus on their studies. Many graduating students would not be able to afford college without the help of the scholarships the ASTDF provides. PETERS' SCHOLARSHIP By: Frank and Nancy Rugani

Sallie Peters, formerly Sadie Siira, was



born in South Range, Michigan on August, 6, 1902. She was the ninth of ten children in the Jacob and Sarah (Moilanen) Siira family. Her parents immigrated to the United States from the Overtornea

area of Finland/Sweden. This area was unique in that when persons from there arrived in the Copper Country in the late 1800s and early 1900s, they could have travelled with passports issued by Finnish, Swedish or Russian Consulates, depending on which country happened to be in power in that area at that time. The defined borders between Finland, Sweden and Russia were not laid out until 1917. Residents usually spoke all three languages, and those ending up in the Copper Country primarily chose Finnish. The Siira family had Russian passports but considered themselves Finns and spoke Finnish at home.

The Siiras owned 36 acres of land in a valley on the north side of Whealkate Bluff on the outskirts of South Range, Michigan. They leased an additional 80 acres from the Copper Range Mining Company. In addition to their ten children, they raised three children of the Nikkinen family after the untimely demise of the Nikkinen parents.

Of these thirteen children, nine attended the Adams Township Schools. However, only one, Morris Nikkinen, graduated from the Painesdale (Jeffers) High School, in 1939. This scenario was not uncommon at this point in the history of Adams Township, as children were needed to work on the family farms and/or gain employment to help the family financially survive.

Sallie (Sadie) left the area in the early 1920s and went to Detroit, Michigan where she married Jesse L. Peters in 1925. Her husband was originally from West Virginia, though his parents were from Kentucky. Together, they established the J. L. Peters Construction Company in Detroit. Jesse was a steel worker and always worked in the construction business. They enjoyed vacationing in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and owned a beautiful peninsula west of Munising, Michigan, on Lake Superior. They were a gracious and generous couple. It is said that when the South American cruise ship passed by their Munising home, it would sound its horn to acknowledge Mr. and Mrs. Peters.

Jesse Peters passed away in 1941 at the age of 42. He was buried in Munising, Michigan.



Sallie operated the J. L. Peters Construction Company for a brief interim and then generously gave the company to her employees. The Peters were always very philanthropic. Sallie reestablished close ties with her siblings in the 1950s. They enjoyed visiting with her at the Westwood Lodge near Munising. After her death on May 17, 1969, in Detroit, Michigan, Sallie willed Suomi College, now Finlandia University, \$50,000 and the Jeffers High School in Painesdale, Michigan, \$10,000. Friends and relatives recall Mrs. Peters saying, "I want to provide for the education of youth; I was denied a college education." She had no children of her own. She had travelled extensively, "in every country but Russia" she said, and showed keen interest in a wide range of humanitarian and educational activities.

The Peters' Scholarship was established at the Jeffers High School in 1970 and every year since, a student has received a Peter's Scholarship. This scholarship is administered by the Adams Township School District Foundation, Inc. Many graduates of the Jeffers High School are grateful to the generosity of Sallie (Sadie Siira) Peters.
