New Opportunities

The Foundation has been an integral player in providing opportunities for the students at Jeffers High School. These opportunities are provided by the generous support of all our donors, most notably John and Ruanne Opie. Over the years, the Opies have provided the Foundation with funds to fully equip two science labs, the purchase of computers for the science and general labs, teacher supplies, a new and safer parking lot, a self funded scholarship to four students each year attending Michigan Technology University and most recently, the new vocational center.

The classes taught in our new vocational center, along with their generous scholarship fund, will allow students to explore a wide range of opportunities in both academic and vocational fields of study. As an administrator, I feel it is a blessing to have the luxury of John and Ruanne Opie's support as we continue to provide these unique opportunities.

A few years ago, I started the practice of performing exit interviews for all seniors. The information I gained helped in shaping our direction as a District. I noted we focused mainly on the needs of students who were pursing a four year degree. Our vocational program for students consisted of one shop class and the nursing and auto mechanics programs offered through the Copper Country Intermediate School District. Today, our program has grown significantly with more opportunities added each year. Trish Sherman, Jeffers High School guidance counselor, summed it up nicely, "We are now addressing multiple intelligences, and that is a rare opportunity for a small school."

The new courses currently offered include welding, carpentry, plumbing, masonry and cosmetology. These courses provide hands-on skills and the opportunity for our students to gain more training by participating in our workbased learning program under the supervision of professionals.

Our new cosmetology teacher, Jessie Hannon, is excited to be teaching this course. "I am sensing a change in the confidence of these girls as they are beginning to learn how to present themselves." This simple concept will give these students an advantage as

they interview for potential jobs or for college admission.

Junior Lauren Huotari is also excited as one of the first students to enroll in the cosmetology course. "It's way better than I expected. We are learning a lot more than just hair design and style."

Senior Jay Stevens enrolled in the carpentry course this year even though he plans to study radiology at NMU in the fall of 2016. "When I get older, I want to know how to do stuff. I don't want to hire someone to do a simple job. I want to do it on my own. This class will allow me to do that."

The Foundation has agreed to help support another course that would expand the greenhouse gardening course into a culinary opportunity. Barb Rose, an individual who helped start the Every Day Healthy, One Day Local project, has garnered support from MTU, local grocers and restaurants to incorporate a class that would allow students to learn about preparing and serving food, cooking on a budget, and growing and preparing food from their own garden. This course would also provide students with the opportunity to participate in work-based learning.

It is an exciting time to be part of the Adams Township School District and Foundation. I encourage you to play a role in providing more opportunities for our students by supporting the Foundation. Every dollar donated provides advantages and opportunities for students in the Adams Township School District.

High School Happenings

The JHS staff underwent some changes for the 2015/16 year that included two retirements and three new staff members. Mr. Ken Kangas retired after a long, but successful, battle with cancer. Mr. Kurt Heinonen, although still serving the district in a reduced capacity, formally retired from full time employment.

We welcomed to our teaching staff Mrs. Madeline Larson, Mr. Samuel Kilpela and Mr. Michael Randell. Mrs. Larson is teaching English and Web composition, filling the position of Mrs. McCormick who left for a teaching position downstate. Mr. Kilpela is currently part-time, teaching elective courses that include personal finance, engineering concepts and design, technology and greenhouse gardening. Mr. Randell is also part-time, teaching welding, electrical and plumbing trades. At the beginning of the second semester we also welcomed Ms. Jessie Hannon to the staff as our part-time cosmetology instructor. We are excited to have the opportunity to expand and enhance our course offerings with the addition of these fine individuals.

The greenhouse gardening class taught by Mr. Kilpela is the result of a grant we received from the efforts of Mr. Ray Sharp at the Western U.P. Health Department. The greenhouse was constructed this fall and is located on the south side of the new gymnasium. Students will have the opportunity to grow food crops during the year and seedlings for sale in the spring.

Mr. Jonathan Kilpela began a project this fall in conjunction with the MDNR. The program is titled "Salmon in the Classroom" and was coordinated and sponsored by Mr. Tom Rozich, a JHS alumnus. The project has students monitoring and caring for salmon eggs until they are ready to be placed in a river. We are hoping the release of the salmon will be at the Little Salmon Trout River in Redridge this spring.

Finally, JHS will start the spring sport season with a varsity boys baseball team. This will be the complement to the varsity girls softball team started two years ago.

Salmon in the Classroom

In 1994, while working as a fisheries biologist for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, I read an article about classrooms in California raising fish. To my thinking, it was something we needed to do in Michigan to provide students with some outdoor environmental education. Coincidentally, I was working weekends as a 1st Mate on a salmon fishing charter boat on Lake Michigan and the Captain, Kevin Hughes, was an elementary school teacher near Manistee. One weekend, between "Fish On's", we talked about initiating a Salmon in the Classroom (SIC) at his school. It was an easy sell.

The following week, I contacted the teacher in California, who provided me with details and a curriculum. Kevin and I were off and running. We received funding from the Manistee County Sport Fishing Assn. Kevin made videos of the equipment and his students, which he took to a teachers' conference the following summer. My phone began to ring often, which pleased Kevin and me. The program has grown steadily in the following years.

Many teachers have indicated to me this program gave students who did not have an interest in school a reason to come, learn, and become educated. My daughter Katie is in the SIC program and our joint biological article in the January 22nd Daily Mining Gazette outdoor page expresses her thoughts on the program's value.

This year, JHS enrolled in the SIC program lead by teacher Jonathan Kilpela.

Equipment including a classroom aquarium for SIC was purchased through the generous contributions of Tom Rozich and Copper Country Trout Unlimited.

This fall, the science department at Jeffers High School began a small-scale salmon hatchery program. In November, we received 200 eyed salmon eggs from the Michigan DNR to raise in a 55-gallon aquarium housed in my science lab. In the month of December, the salmon hatched, surviving on egg yolk sacs for several weeks before being given solid food to eat. The salmon fry are currently under 2 inches long, and we plan to raise them until they are approximately 4-5 inches long, which is when we will release them into a local stream.



The DNR sets various requirements for potential streams into which we will release the salmon. They recommended either the Traprock River, the Misery River, or the Salmon Trout River, below the Redridge Dam. My biology classes will be evaluating these rivers and determining which river would be the best for our salmon release.

The Salmon in the Classroom Program was started by the Michigan DNR in the late 1990's and has now spread to over 200 schools across the state, including Jeffers High School. Funding for the JHS Salmon in the Classroom program was acquired through the generosity of donors including Tom Rozich and the Copper Country Chapter of Trout Unlimited. Sustained funding for additional recurring program expenses will be covered by our Lake Superior Stewardship Initiative (LSSI) grant. This will ensure that our Salmon in the Classroom program will continue for years to come.

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
Greenhouse Gardening

The newest structure built this past year was the greenhouse at Jeffers High School. With our mild start to December we were able to have it completed before the snow started to fall. The new greenhouse is located on the south side of the gym to maximize the solar radiation the plants receive and is attached to the exterior wall to help it stay warm during cold nights. The greenhouse class hopes to begin growing vegetables and flowers during the late part of March inside of the greenhouse.

The greenhouse/gardening class is designed to educate the students about the benefits of eating whole foods and supporting the local gardening community. Additionally the class curriculum is designed to promote healthy eating and to give the students knowledge of the industrial food system and benefits of supporting alternative means of farming in the community. The students have had a chance to plant flowers and vegetables from seeds this winter, using grow lights, and they will be transplanting them into the greenhouse once the danger of frost has passed. Student have already planted and researched a variety of flowers and are monitoring the growth of their own choice of plants. Educating our students about the food they eat is one of the most important life skills we can give them. What we eat and where it comes from can have a major impact on our health and the local economy. I think offering a Greenhouse/Gardening class at Jeffers is a true life skill that our students will benefit from for years to come.

Exploring Cosmetology

Cosmetology careers have seen a steady growth pattern over the past twelve years. According to the National Accrediting Commission of Cosmetology Arts and Sciences (NACCAS), 1,682,641 professionals were employed in 370,215 salons, which included nail salons, barber shops, beauty salons and unisex salons. There has been an 18.3% growth in the number of salons during the past three years in which 65% of the salons are employer-owned. The NACCAS report indicated 53% of salon owners have job openings, which suggests the overwhelming need for cosmetologist and the shortage of those professionals.

The new cosmetology course offered in the trades building will include many specialized options within the cosmetology field. These options include natural hair care, esthetics, nail technician and many other avenues in this artistry. This new course will allow each student to have a look into opportunities found in cosmetology. With an industry relevant curriculum, we will practice elevated standards of safety, sanitation procedures, and the basic building blocks needed in order to work hands-on in this field. Each student will learn to become confident in both theory and practical areas of cosmetology. The "salon," fully-funded by John and Ruanne Opie, is equipped and furnished with the proper instruments and materials enabling each student to gain hands-on experience on performing beauty treatments.

The overall objective of this course is to supply a student with enough background knowledge to help decide if a career in this field will be relevant to their future. This program will guide each student with personal growth, social growth, confidence and customer service skills, all of which are essential for success.
